1920s and 1930s Summative Assignment

Tasks:

You will individually create a children's book, for children ages 5-8. Your story needs to focus on an important person or event from the list provided, have a logical progression, and be age appropriate. Your children's book will consist of a minimum of 10 pages, a creative book cover, and a bibliography.

Requirements:

- Research your topic and create a basic story line. Your story must have a logical beginning, use key events of the event or the person's life, and end with a moral or lesson learned. Your story must be:
 - a. Based on true events
 - b. Suitable for 5-8 year olds (suitable level of language, content, and images)
 - c. Typed in large font
 - d. No more than 4 sentences per page
- 2. Draw your images. You may choose to draw free-hand, trace, or use cut-outs (printed images from the internet but they shouldn't be basic squares cut out, there should be effort in layout). Illustrations should be clear, colourful and relate to the text on the page. The illustrations should also show variety.
- 3. You must include a creative cover page (front and back covers). It must include a fun title that relates to your topic, an image, and your name (as the author and illustrator).
- 4. Your bibliography must be a separate page and include the proper MLA citation (you can find this online). You must use at least THREE sources.

Why? – famous, legacy (importance in history)

When? – event happened

Where? – it happened

Who? – individuals or gropus involved

What? – caused/started it, individuals or groups did, major events, turning point

How? – it ended

Why? – importance in history, impact or major effects (long or short term)
