

METAPHOR

met·a·phor /ˈmedəˌfôr,ˈmedəˌfər/ •

a figure of speech in which a word or phrase is applied to an object or action to which it is not literally applicable.

""I had fallen through a trapdoor of depression," said Mark, who was fond of theatrical metaphors" synonyms: figure of speech, image, trope, analogy, comparison, symbol, word painting/picture

"the profusion of metaphors in her everyday speech has gotten pretty tiresome"

a thing regarded as representative or symbolic of something else, especially something abstract.
 "the amounts of money being lost by the company were enough to make it a metaphor for an industry that was teetering"

SIMILE

sim·i·le

/ˈsiməlē/ •

noun

a figure of speech involving the comparison of one thing with another thing of a different kind, used to make a description more emphatic or vivid (e.g., as brave as a lion, crazy like a fox).

• the use of simile.

METONYM

met·o·nym

/ˈmedəˌnim/ •)

noun

a word, name, or expression used as a substitute for something else with which it is closely associated. For example, *Washington* is a metonym for the federal government of the US.

METONYM

- Metonymy replaces the original word with another word with similar meaning
- Ex. "The pen is mightier than the sword" (pen = writing and sword = military aggression or force"
- Ex. "The suits" = business people
- Ex. Dish plate of food
- Ex. "Give me a hand" = help
- "Friends, Romans, Countrymen, lend me your ears" (ear = listening replacing the concept paying attention)
- Why use Metonym? Sometimes it sounds better to replace multiple words with a single one (especially in poetry).
