& A poet is somebody who feels, and who expresses his feelings through words. This may sound easy. It isn't

A lot of people think or believe or know they feel – but that's thinking or believing or knowing; not feeling, and poetry is feeling – not knowing or believing or thinking.

Almost anybody can learn to think or believe or know, but not a single human being can be taught to feel. Why? Because whenever you think or you believe or you know you're a lot of other people; but the moment you feel, you're NOBODY-BUT-YOURSELF.

Poetry Terms

de·no·ta·tion

/ˌdēnōˈtāSHən/ •

noun

the literal or primary meaning of a word, in contrast to the feelings or ideas that the word suggests. "beyond their immediate denotation, the words have a connotative power"

- the action or process of indicating or referring to something by means of a word, symbol, etc.
- PHILOSOPHY
 the object or concept to which a term refers, or the set of objects of which a predicate is true.

Denotation

con·no·ta·tion

/ˌkänəˈtāSH(ə)n/ •

noun

an idea or feeling that a word invokes in addition to its literal or primary meaning.

"the word "discipline" has unhappy connotations of punishment and repression"

synonyms: overtone, undertone, undercurrent, implication, hidden meaning, nuance, hint, echo, vibration, association, intimation, suggestion, suspicion, insinuation

"there was a connotation of distrust in his voice"

PHILOSOPHY

the abstract meaning or intension of a term, which forms a principle determining which objects or concepts it applies to.

Connotation

"Hollywood"

- Ø Denotes a place, an area of Los Angeles, worldwide known as the centre of the American movie industry.

☼ Over time words that denote approximately the same thing may acquire additional meanings, connotations, that are either positive or negative. Ex. Gay, minority, feminist, motherhood, family

Gun Violence

- "I kind of wrote the song to bring awareness to the issue. That sort of thing keeps happening more and more in our country; it's kind of turning into an epidemic. To me the epidemic isn't gun violence; the epidemic is lack of family, lack of love, and isolation kids who don't have anywhere to go or anyone to talk to and that's what makes them snap."
- Mark Foster "wrote the song about the growing trend of mental illness among teenagers in a bid to create a conversation about the need for change."
